MATTERS ARISING FROM THE 48TH MEETING 5.0 1 5.1 Observations and Responses. 2 On the concern expressed by the committee over the non-completion of the CEFTER Complex at the New GRA which may ultimately result into a huge loss, the Centre Leader reported that the Project Team led by the DVC, Administration had gone to the site for 5 an inspection and put all the contractors to task. This action yielded positive results; work 6 has been completed, the World Bank came for inspection and based on their scores funds 7 had been disbursed to the Centre. The WB team expressed satisfaction that the university 8 has used the funds excellently well. The CL added that efforts were being made to bring 9 in power supply and introduce a water works in order to meet the needs of both staff 10 and students. 11 5.2 Observations and Responses. 12 Following the Committee's resolution to inspect all other projects funded by the Centre 13 with particular attention on the Fish Pond situated in the Department of Biological 14 15 sciences, a three-man committee was constituted to review the matter and report. The committee was Chaired by Dr. Stephen Gbaorun Yiase, immedeiate past Dean, Faculty of 16 Science. Other members were Dr. Philip T. Abachi, Dean of Social Sciences; and Prof. 17 David Amokaha Aboho. Mr. Aku Korshima was the Secretary 18 5.2.1 The committee's terms of reference were: 19 To liaise with both the new and immediate past Heads of the Department, to unravel the 20 21 cause of non-completion of the Fish Hatchery Project and To consider any other ancillary matters that may be essential to the execution of the 22 assignment 23 5.2.2 Finding/Recommendation of the committee: 24 25 The summary of the findings were that: work had been completed and the contractor fully paid; though connected to the University Library borehole the hatchery had no water 26 27 because the borehole itself has no water; the project would have been positioned near the BSU Water Treatment Plant by the River Benue side; some equipments and materials 28 were needed to make the hatchery become functional and the list was rather long; the 29

pond was clogged with leaves from the surrounding trees and this can pollute the pond when operational and there were signs of defecation in the pit.

The recommendations were that a high yielding water borehole and an overhead tank be provided; CEFTER Management should provide a minimum of the listed items by the Department to get the project working; security should be provided at the site; and a roof should be made over the pond to prevent leaves from falling into the pond and contaminating the water.

5.2.3 Noting the report as captured in 5.3 above, the PTC expressed displeasure over the manner in which the department had managed the project. It was generally opined that the department ought to have been more responsive on the matter. It was therefore, resolved that a strongly worded letter be written to the department indicating the feelings of the committee and also inform them to forward a request on what was needed to make the hatchery functional. A PhD student should be given the project as part of his/her research and be challenged to get it working; and a staff should be attached to guide the student. It was also resolved that a net or a perimeter fence be put round the pond for protection.

5.3 *Visit by the Greenwich University Team:*

5.3.1

Referring to a document titled "Information on New Partnership with the Natural Resources Institute, University of Greenwich" which was distributed to members; the Chairman reported that the relationship was to be focused on items 3b. ie solutions to 'Food Loss and Waste'; and item 4(a-e) about collaborations on students support and staff training as well as innovative laboratory research related matters. He stated two names of staff who had already been forwarded and they were being interviewed for training.

The meeting was informed that the MOU between Greenwich University and BSU had already been signed; that the Centre Leader, Dr. Barnabas Achakpa Ikyo had been offered a Visiting Fellow Professor (without financial benefits) with the University of Greenwich and same arrangement was also being processed for the Vice-Chancellor, Prof. Msugh Moses kembe.
